Come with Backroads on this one-of-a-kind journey to experience Eastern Europe's re-emergence. From Budapest, travel to Hungary's idyllic wine-growing area, Tokaj. Walk from private vineyards to medieval towns before shuttling into Slovakia's famed Spis region. Hike through hills to Slovakia's largest castle, then venture into more challenging mountain terrain and varied weather in the High Tatras, the loftiest range of the Carpathians. Weather permitting, gondolas whisk us to grand heights for hikes past 9,000-foot granite peaks, emerald mountain lakes and alpine flora. As a final flourish, visit Kraków, a city buzzing with history and architectural wonders.

DAY 1

Meet your Backroads Trip Leaders (the folks wearing Backroads T-shirts) at 8:30 a.m. in the lobby of the Budapest InterContinental, located 200 yards southeast of Chain Bridge (Apaczai Csere J.U. 12–14). **Please arrive dressed in your hiking clothes and have your daypack and rain jacket handy.** See "Arriving & Departing" for additional logistics information.

SHUTTLE TO TARCAL 3 HOURS

DEGENFELD WARM-UP WALK 5 MILES (300-FOOT ELEVATION GAIN)

Welcome to the heart of Europe! From Budapest, we shuttle through the countryside to the small town of Tarcál, set in Hungary's famed Tokaj-Hegyalja wine region, a World Heritage site. Upon arrival at the luxurious Baroque-style Gróf Degenfeld Castle Hotel, a former royal estate with its own vineyard, we get better acquainted over a lunch of delicious local specialties. Today's warm-up walk is a great introduction to the rolling terrain you'll experience this week. Wander along footpaths through the surrounding vineyards, pass the hotel's winery and ascend to a tiny abandoned church. The vistas from here are impressive—you'll enjoy a nice overview of small villages, orchards and grapevine-laced hills of Hungarian wine country.

This evening we gather for a reception followed by dinner in the hotel's restaurant overlooking the adjacent parkland. *Lodging: Gróf Degenfeld Castle Hotel*

DAY 2

TOKAJ ROUTE 6.3 MILES WITH SHUTTLE (1,500-FOOT ELEVATION GAIN)

FREE TIME IN TOKAJ

Ready for some climbs today? From the hotel, we follow footpaths and narrow winding dirt roads to a ridge in the Tokaj hills. The ridgeline leads to the romantic old town of Tokaj, settled by French and Italian vintners in the Middle Ages. Thanks to its fertile volcanic soil, sunny hillsides and mild climate, this region is ideal for grape cultivation—it's even thought that the Celts had vineyards here. Make your way to the town square, and spend some time exploring and people watching. Head to a café for lunch on your own, browse the shops, wander through the museum and admire the surrounding architecture. After a short shuttle in the afternoon, you'll have time to enjoy the hotel's swimming pool,

sauna and tennis courts. Before dinner we gather for a wine tasting in the ancient Rakoczi cellars, built during the 15th century and owned by kings, princes and generals. The Tokaj foothills became the world's first *appellation contrôlée* and are now listed as a World Heritage site. You're in for a treat if you've never sampled Tokaj wine before; Louis XIV has described it as the "wine of kings and the king of wines." *Lodging: Gróf Degenfeld Castle Hotel*

DAY 3

SHUTTLE TO ZEHRA 4 HOURS

SPIŠ CASTLE HIKE 2.9 MILES (600-FOOT ELEVATION GAIN)

LONGER OPTION: SPISSKA KAPITULA 5.4 MILES (1,000-FOOT ELEVATION GAIN)

SHUTTLE TO TATRANSKÁ LOMNICA 1 HOUR

It's a big travel day today, as we drive from Hungary into Slovakia—and into old-world Europe. Our destination is the Spiš region of eastern Slovakia, where rolling forested hills and distant high peaks resemble the Cascades of the United States. Along the way, explore the 12th-century Spiš Castle. Poised on a limestone cliff at the crossroads of medieval merchant routes, this World Heritage site is one of the largest and most distinctive castles in Central Europe.

From the castle, it's not too much farther to Tatranská Lomnica, a lively resort town known as the gateway to the High Tatras. We spend the night amid historic elegance at the Grandhotel Praha, resplendent with its bright red roof and coat of Hapsburg yellow, set beneath Lomnický peak. After getting settled in your room, head out and have a look around Tatranská Lomnica. (There's a fun bobsleigh ride a short stroll away.) Or take advantage of the amenities at our hotel—unwind in the sauna, soak in the hot tub or swim a few laps in the indoor pool. *Lodging: Grandhotel Praha*

DAY 4

HIGH TATRAS HIKE 8.7 MILES, DESCENDING VIA GONDOLA (1,500-FOOT ELEVATION GAIN)

STRENUOUS OPTION: 7.5 MILES (1,200-FOOT ELEVATION GAIN)

We're perfectly situated to take advantage of a favorite Tatra hike. Fuel up with a hearty breakfast because today's route poses some challenges, with steeper slopes and uneven, rocky footing. We travel by gondola into the High Tatras on the border between Slovakia and Poland. The highest section of the Carpathian Mountains, it's hailed as Europe's grandest mountain range, aside from the Alps. The loftiest peaks of the Tatras are found in Slovakia, while the region's largest lakes are in Poland. Our path winds past spruce forests, river crossings and waterfalls before a gradual climb for views of the dramatic rocky peaks.

If you're in the mood for a workout, choose the strenuous option. You'll literally cross the High Tatras, ascending about 1,200 feet and skirting around alpine lakes and windswept granite peaks. Descend into Javorina Valley, where you'll come upon Chalet Pri Zelenom Plese (Chalet at the Green Lake), an alpine hiker's hut built in 1924 and one of the most dramatically situated chalets in the High Tatras. (The longer option is challenging with lots of loose rocks on the trails, so be sure to take your time and grab onto the fixed chains to help maintain your footing.) At the hut, refuel with soup, a sandwich and inspiring vistas. Continue on the trail by way of a valley, with mountain ranges towering above and forests and rivers at trail-level. Ride the gondola down to our awaiting shuttle.

Tonight's excellent alpine accommodations feature mountain views, a swimming pool, bowling alley and more. Enjoy! *Lodging: Hotel Kolowrat*

DAY 5

SHUTTLE TO MORSKIE OKO 45 MINUTES

WIELKI STAW HIKE 9.5 MILES WITH SHUTTLE (2,800-FOOT ELEVATION GAIN)

SHORTER OPTION: MORSKIE OKO 7.9 MILES WITH SHUTTLE (2,200-FOOT ELEVATION GAIN)

This morning, we shuttle across the border and set our sights on the Polish side of the Tatras. For the next two days we'll tackle challenging terrain that warrants careful foot placement; a professional certified Polish hiking guide will be on hand to help. Leave the crowds at the trailhead for the chance to see native fauna—if we're very lucky, we could see wildcats, boars and maybe even chamois or black bears. Make your ascent to Morskie Oko, one of the few lakes in the Tatras with a natural supply of fish, easily visible in the clear water. An alpine hiker's hut along the shore is the perfect resting spot for eating your pack lunch. If you're up for the climb, continue to the saddle of the Mieguszwiecki Kociol ridge for an outstanding view of the Valley of Five Polish Lakes. Descend slowly as you navigate the steep and slippery footing. Those who have opted for the long route will be greeted at the end with a traditional horse-drawn buggy to bring you, with open-top view of the mountains, back to the trailhead. From here we shuttle to Zakopane, a vibrant town touted by physicians in the 1880s for the curative properties of its mountain climate. It's currently known as Poland's winter sports capital.

Depending on when you arrive in town, you may have time to shop and explore. If you opt for a caffeine fix, don't worry, that's not motor oil in your cup. It's Polish-style coffee—thick, strong, drunk black and with lots of sugar! In the mood to soothe your hiking muscles? Pamper yourself with a spa treatment (not included in the trip price) at our hotel's state-of-the-art fitness center, swim a few laps in the pool or enjoy a soak in the hot tub. Cap off the day with dinner at the hotel's elegant restaurant. *Lodging: Hotel Belvedere Resort & Spa*

DAY 6

KASPROWY WIERCH HIKE 9.3 MILES WITH SHUTTLE (2,400-FOOT ELEVATION GAIN)

Today you have another opportunity to experience the glory of the High Tatras. The hike begins with an ascent up a rocky incline before reaching the crest that rewards you with breathtaking views of the Zakopane valley. You might be tempted to have lunch at the group of huts awaiting you ahead, but we recommend waiting to eat along the Black Lake's picturesque shore, if weather permits.

Take in the clean mountain air and the stunning setting, looking up to Mount Rysy, Poland's highest mountain, whose lofty peaks tower above a steep slope of green forest to the awaiting lake. The return to Kunize is downhill, but watch your footing because the path is known to have loose rocks.

This evening, dinner is on your own in Zakopane, which has no shortage of restaurants offering hearty Polish *górale* (mountaineer) cuisine, as well as kebabs, potato pancakes (*placki*) and waffles with whipped cream (*gojry*). *Lodging: Hotel Belvedere Resort & Spa*

DAY 7

KIRY HIKE 5 MILES (100-FOOT ELEVATION GAIN)

SHUTTLE TO KRAKÓW 2 HOURS

FREE TIME IN KRAKÓW

Start the day with an easy countryside hike in the alpine setting above Zakopane, replete with pine tree forests, haystacks and farmers tending to their sheep. Take a closer look at

the architecture of the alpine wooden homes as we wander through the storybook villages.

Later, say goodbye to Zakopane and shuttle to Kraków, where you have time to explore and eat lunch on your own. There's so much to see and do in Kraków, it's easy to make the most of this captivating city. (We suggest staying on a few extra days if you can.) It's flat, easy to navigate on foot and positively spilling over with history, noteworthy architecture and wonderful places to eat and drink. Most of the city's intriguing sites—except for the hilltop Wawel Castle and the Jewish quarter of Kazimierz, with its ancient synagogues—can be found within the Planty, a greenbelt encircling the Old Town. Enjoy the magnificent main square, the biggest in medieval Europe, which bustles with buskers, flower and candy vendors, loitering students, guidebook-wearers and more than a few pigeons. Or venture off the beaten path to the atmospheric cafés surrounding the square. Try the local spirits. Or have some coffee and cake. Fear the waiter wants his table back an hour later? Ask for water “with gas” and linger a bit longer.

We think you'll like the charm and old-world elegance of Hotel Copernicus, located at the foot of Wawel Castle on one of the city's most charming streets. At tonight's festive farewell dinner, raise a toast to an unforgettable experience in Eastern Europe. *Lodging: Hotel Copernicus*

DAY 8

WALKING TOUR OF KRAKÓW 2½ HOURS

This morning you can add a final flourish to your trip by joining our guided walk through Kraków's Old Town. If you'd rather sleep in, feel free to do so and wrap up your trip with a leisurely breakfast instead.

If you would prefer to visit the Auschwitz-Birkenau Memorial and Museum (about an hour's drive from Kraków) today, please let your Trip Leaders know. While we don't offer a group tour here, out of respect for anyone who seeks a more personal and introspective experience, we're happy to help you arrange transportation to the site, and even a guide if you wish.

CONCLUSION OF THE TRIP

The drive to the airport takes approximately 20 minutes, depending on traffic, so please be sure to plan your departure time accordingly.

FLIGHT ARRANGEMENTS

This trip begins in Budapest, Hungary, and ends in Kraków, Poland. We suggest flying into Budapest (airport code: BUD; www.bud.hu/english), and flying out of Kraków (airport code: KRK; www.lotnisko-balice.pl/strona_en.html).

For help arranging air transport to and from your Backroads trip, please work with your own travel agent, the airline directly or an online travel site. TRANSPORTATION FROM THE AIRPORT TO THE INTERCONTINENTAL AND CENTRAL BUDAPEST

The Budapest airport is located 25–40 minutes outside of the city.

Taxi service from the airport to the InterContinental costs \$30–\$40. Be sure to ask for the fare in advance.

Budapest Airport Minibus service is available from the airport to central Budapest for approximately \$15 per person.

KRAKOW

HOTEL COPERNICUS (OUR HOTEL ON DAY 7)

A top-of-the-line hotel, located in a great neighborhood in Old Town, the Copernicus is considered among the city's most interesting examples of medieval residential architecture. According to legend, Copernicus himself stayed here, and traces of the hotel's history can be seen in the Renaissance portals, paintings and mosaics. The hotel is located at the foot of Wavel Castle on a charming street, shoulder-to-shoulder with stately tenement houses dating back to the Middle Ages. Amid the old-world ambience, you'll enjoy no shortage of modern comforts, including guest rooms decked out in velvet and silk, marble bathrooms and a rooftop bar with great castle views. ul. Set in a restored 15th-century townhouse, the Wentzl features guest rooms with dark wood beam ceilings and huge soundproofed windows offering views of the activity on the square. You’ll also enjoy extra perks like comfy robes and porcelain tea sets in each room. And for the ultimate taste of history, visit the hotel’s restaurant, which has been in operation since 1792, serving hearty Polish specialties. (You can’t help but notice the huge painting of the Virgin Mary on the building’s façade. With a guest list that once included the likes of Chopin, Liszt, Balzac and Tsar Alexander II, the Pod Różą (“Under the Rose”) is one of the most delightful hotels in Kraków. You’re sure to appreciate its location on the fashionable shopping street, Florianska. Each of the handsome high-ceilinged guest rooms has been individually decorated and offers lots of old-world charm as well as all the necessary modern amenities. Downstairs you’ll find two restaurants worth checking out: one that serves international cuisine in contemporary surroundings and another that offers Italian cuisine in a cozy romantic setting. ul.
